





It is this distinctive component of Bank Street's program that led the Carnegie Corporation of New York to name Bank Street as one of its eleven partners in Teachers for a New Era, a national initiative to model excellence and improve the field of teacher preparation.

It has long been held that one of the best measures of a society is the value it places on its children. At Bank Street, we welcome you to join with us in becoming professionals seeking to improve our society, one child, one class, one school at a time.
