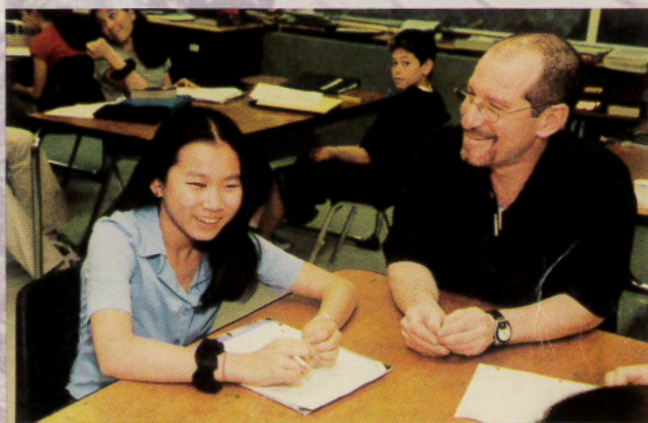

The cornerstone of our Graduate School programs is advisement, which was recognized by the National Commission for Teaching and America's Future as a critical element when they selected Bank Street as one of seven exemplary models for teacher education. Through advisement, students have an opportunity to work closely in

small groups of no more than seven students with a member of the faculty in a supervised placement. In this day and age of large lecture halls, mass production, and anonymity, Bank Street is a small oasis where students and faculty interact as a genuine learning community.

Since coming to Bank Street six years ago, I have frequently met Graduate School alumni who speak of the ways in which their experience transformed their thinking and practice about teaching and about leadership. They often say, "Bank Street changed my life." I hope that one day you will feel the same way.
